Dear Cluster Family,

Future Army officers are subjected to an experience nicknamed the “hotbox.” It takes place after an infantry training exercise, during what’s called the after-action review. Whoever led the unit during the training exercise, which usually focuses on capturing some objective, is required to stand in front of a scale model of the area in which the action took place. The model is made out of earth, twigs, etc.—whatever is handy—and contained in a frame fashioned from sticks or rocks (imagine creating a 3-D map in a sandbox, but with dirt instead of sand).

The leader has to stand in a little area, also framed-in, just big enough for one person to stand in comfortably, and is then made to review what happened, why decisions were made, what worked, or what went wrong, with the instructor and with the rest of the unit.

The leader is then given a grade by the instructor, who is usually an expert officer or NCO with no time for mistakes.

This little area is called the “hotbox,” and it’s surprising how hot it can get in there for the officer candidate—even outdoors during the winter!

Most people find standing in the “hotbox” to be peppered with tough questions about what happened during the exercise, a far more uncomfortable experience than the mentally and physically taxing work of planning and carrying out the exercise itself. Even the calmest, most collected leader-types who handle stress well seem to end up speechless and sweating during at least one of their turns in the “hotbox.” It can be quite entertaining—until it’s your turn!

Here we are at the beginning of a new year. A fresh beginning. It’s also important to look back. We are not asked to look back to beat ourselves up, to cry over spilled milk, or to obsess about things beyond our control. However, Scripture seems to be telling us in these first days of the new year that it is worth our while to look back.

The reason that it is worth our while to look back is that God wants to meet us in the hotboxes of our lives. Not to make us sweat like a nervous officer candidate being grilled by a no-nonsense sergeant, but to be at peace with ourselves. (Note: peace is not the same thing as complacency).

John the Baptist keeps appearing in the weekday Mass readings in these first days of the year. John is only able to know who Christ is because John knows who he himself is. Otherwise, it would be too tempting for John to trick himself into letting others think that John was the Messiah, not Jesus. John couldn’t know Jesus without knowing himself. The same is true for us.

The Church has long recommended that we examine our consciences regularly: this means looking back daily on what has happened, for the purpose of **asking God in** to all the successes, failures, joys, sorrows, confusions, and even and especially the moments of plain old sin that are part of our lives. The monastic writers of the middle ages were really big on this idea: you can have no compassion on anyone else—or even on God—without first having compassion on yourself. And, you cannot have compassion on yourself unless you ask God into the swirl of thoughts or feelings that come up surrounding whatever burdens or confuses you. That’s not the same as obsessing about it or beating a dead horse, or reliving ancient history. It just means not fleeing what troubles us when it troubles us, but laying hold of it, and asking God in. Otherwise, it remains unfinished business that will just keep estranging us from ourselves. We end up spending all our energy on self-fleeing, not really living.

It is crucial that we have helpers in this process. First, we have to have a mentor or spiritual father/mother, or brother/sister, who we can talk things over with. This can be anyone who is mature in heart.

Second, we must have a relationship with a priest who as a confessor, will bring the healing ray of God’s love into the darkest corners of our inner “basement” through the Sacrament of Penance. (One person can, but doesn’t have to, fill both of these roles).

Thirdly, it may be prudent to work with a helper who is both a trained professional in the mental health field, and a believer. Why has God allowed mankind to unlock the sciences of authentic psychology and psychiatry, if not to help us to live our Christian calling to reconciliation to God, self and others? It is no disgrace to seek the assistance of such a helper to work through our pain and foibles. The real disgrace is when people fail to do so, and hurt both themselves and communities. That is a species of bullying. *Humility* is a Christian virtue, and it can mean turning the other cheek... but willful **complicitness with bullying** is a **vice**. This is because when we allow a bully to go unchallenged, we are really allowing that bully to continue on the self-destructive path of trying to replace reality with unreality, which will also degrade, cheapen and destroy us as it seeps in to our too-passive-to-be-bothered hearts.

As we begin 2012, let’s ask God into all that was in 2011. Paradoxically, we become trapped in the past and more obsessed by it the more we try to flee it, rather than asking God into it to help us move on.



When is Epiphany?

When did we stop celebrating the Epiphany on January 6? Does that affect the length of the octave of Christmas? Kelly

Dear Kelly,

The *Code of Canon Law* says that Sundays are to be "observed as the foremost holy day of obligation in the universal Church" (1246). That canon also allows national conferences of bishops to "abolish certain holy days of obligation or transfer them to a Sunday."

In November 1983, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops approved the transfer of the solemnity of the Epiphany (January 6) to the first Sunday after January 1. It was reviewed by the Holy See (Vatican) and promulgated in March 1984.

Liturgical celebrations are distinguished as solemnities, feasts, and memorials according to their importance. The two greatest solemnities, Easter and Christmas, continue for an octave (eight days). Since the octave of Christmas runs from December 25 to January 1 (the solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God), it's not affected by the transfer of the Epiphany celebration.

Liturgically, the days after January 1 through the Baptism of the Lord are part of the season of Christmas even though they're not part of the octave of Christmas. *Byron Miller, CSSR*
